**SPOKANE RECEIVES TREE CITY USA
DESIGNATION**

Honor Marks 7th Year in a Row Spokane Is Recognized

Spokane will receive its seventh year in a row designation as a Tree City USA during the annual Arbor Day celebration April 24th at Finch Arboretum.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by The National Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters.

To qualify for Tree City USA distinction, a city must meet four standards that ensure the community has a viable tree management plan and program.

Specifically, the requirements involve having:

- A Tree Board or Department
- A Tree Care Ordinance
- A Community Forestry Program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita
- An Arbor Day Observance and Proclamation

The public is invited to take part in Spokane's Arbor Day Celebration on Saturday, April 24, 2010 from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the John A. Finch Arboretum. The Arboretum is located at the intersection of "F" Street and Sunset Highway. Arbor Day activities are FREE and take place rain or shine. Please see attached flyer and map to the Arboretum.

About the Tree City USA Designation

A community's public image is a very real phenomenon and important in many ways. Being a Tree City USA helps present the kind of image that most citizens want to have for the place they live or conduct business. The Tree City USA signs at community entrances tell visitors that here is a community that cares about its environment. It is also an indication to prospective businesses that the quality of life may be better here. It has even been known to be a factor in where meetings or conferences have been held. Gaining and retaining Tree City USA recognition is an award to the tree workers, managers, volunteers, tree board members and others who work on behalf of better care of a community's trees.

About Spokane Parks and Recreation
